We have just returned from a most successful Laughlin trip – at least monetarily successful for a number of our members who each won several hundred dollars. The weather was pleasant, the crowds were moderate and the slots were reasonably hot. I want to thank Judy Wyka for stepping in at the last minute and taking Sharon's job of assisting me. She did a wonderful job. When not gambling, a number of folks hit the Outlet Center and did a bit of shopping or went to the movies or strolled along the river walk. There really was not a dull moment. Now we can start making plans for upcoming trips. The signup sheet for a truly interesting trip in June is on the board in the Clubhouse.

Since so many of us have eye trouble as we age, I thought it might be interesting to "Meet the Miracle Workers" on June 10th. According to research, every 11 minutes a person in the United States loses their sight. As I said, diminished eyesight is part of the aging process. But, thanks to modern technology, living is becoming easier for the visually impaired. We begin our day at the Braille Institute, a service organization for blind and visually impaired adults. We'll see students attending classes and learning to live with their impairment. We'll learn the basics of Braille and see how brailling is actually done.

We will then head over to Universal Citywalk's Saddle Ranch Chop House for a buffet lunch. The reminder of the afternoon is spent visiting Guide Dogs of America. For more than 50 years, Guide Dogs of America has bred, raised and trained some of the world's most dedicated dogs and matched them with blind people of all ages. On this tour that we have scheduled for Tuesday, June 10, we learn how the loving, working partnership of dog and human develops and is carried out. I would really like to have this trip go, but we need your help. We are way short of signups. If we don't get at least 29 in the next two weeks, I think you know what will happen. The cost of this trip is \$82.00

On July 12, I thought we would take in a fascinating exhibit entitled "Pompeii, The Exhibition" at the California Science Center. In the year 79 AD., Pompeii vanished beneath thick layers of volcanic ash left by the eruption of Mount Vesuvius. But what nature destroyed, it also preserved. Pompeii: The Exhibition features over 150 precious artifacts on loan from the Naples National Archaeological Museum in Italy which offers a glimpse into the opulent lifestyle and tragic end of this ancient Roman society forgotten for centuries until its rediscovery over 250 years ago. Through excavated artifacts, multimedia experiences, and handson science exhibits, we will learn the science of archaeology, volcanology, and Roman engineering while exploring the ancient civilization of Pompeii. The cost of this fascinating tour including round trip motor coach transportation, lunch at Philippe's the Original, and Driver gratuity is \$90.00.

On Sunday, August 24, we will be attending a wonderful California Philharmonic concert entitled "Broadway and Bolero" at the Walt Disney Music Center. Music selections offered will be from "Chicago", "Evita", "Cats", "Bolero" and "Espana." This trip will also be discussed at our June 5 meeting. **Stay tuned for upcoming trips in September and October.**


As newly appointed Area 6 Monitor, I would like to thank Tony and Sam and their crew for the work requests they have honored in a very short period of time.
