President's Report: Gail Standley gave a summary and explained why the EV charging stations were not installed and informed the Association that New Horizons might no longer qualify for the rebate program, as a result, if the application is withdrawn there will be a penalty.

NEW BUSINESS

Ratify Plumbing proposal: Following discussion the board voted to ratify the proposal for the ongoing preventative maintenance program to service exterior main sewer lines. **GR Plumbing Service** completed buildings' **602**, **620**, **621**, **622**, **623**, **624**, and **625** for a total of **\$6,200.00**._Motion: Gail Standley made a motion to ratify the main sewer line jetting and clearing for seven buildings in area **600** for a total of **\$6,200.00**. Joanie Jones seconded the motion. (M/S/C: 6-0)

Sewer Line Preventative Maintenance: For budget purposes the board approved a budget not to exceed \$10,000/month to continue monthly main sewer preventative maintenance jetting. *Motion:* Gail Standley made a motion to approve a monthly budget for on-going preventative maintenance exterior sewer line program NTE \$10,000. Tom Kasterko seconded the motion. (M/S/C: 6-0)

The board reviewed and addressed correspondence submitted to the Board and Janet.

ADJOURNMENT

With no further business to discuss, the Board of Directors General Session Meeting was adjourned by Board President, Gail Standley at 3:18 pm.



New Horizons Rules to Live By:





GUEST POLICY

New Horizons recognizes that at times circumstances will prevent residents from accompanying their guests to our recreational facilities. This section describes the procedure to be followed to provide quests access to common areas and limited use of other facilities within New Horizons without the residents being present. This is limited to adult guests and their immediate family. Persons who wish to be included in the quest policy must register with the New Horizons office. The guest must be at least 18 years of age to qualify for these privileges. The host resident is responsible for the guest's behavior including compliance with all rules and regulations. The guest policy is a privilege extended by New Horizons and, as such, may be canceled and not granted in the future to those who have failed to abide by our rules and regulations. A list will be maintained by the office of those ineligible to obtain future guest badge privileges... From our Rules & Regulations .

- You can provide the address or use the App to identify your location; when you click on empty space, it will GPS your location. Tap the center or manually enter the address. Manually type your location. It will verify the address, press. OK
- Type in what the issue is (i.e. graffiti).
- If you take a picture, the A**pp** will know your location. You can report with your personal information or anonymously.





Go Green

Let's talk about Soil Conservation!!

"Soil conservation as defined by Wikipedia is the prevention of loss of the topmost layer of the soil from erosion or prevention of reduced fertility caused by over usage, acidification, salinization or other chemical soil contamination."



"So what?" You may say. "We are not farmers here at New Horizons."

However, we are concerned about the health of our plantings. For our plants and greens to grow, water and nutrients must reach the roots. This cannot happen if the soil is contaminated and made insolvable by pesticides or if the soil is washed away by erosion. **Bare soil will wash away** – that's why we need to protect the soil by covering it with drought tolerant ground cover or layers of organic mulch (wood chips, compost). **Go Green** continues to encourage this practice.

Not only do pesticides poison our soil, but they also leach into our water table either through erosion or through the soil. This creates a domino effect. Water containing this poison, is eroding (washing into the drainage systems) which ends up in the ocean resulting in killing the coral reefs and costal animals.


