

Below are a few reminders:

- No smoking in common areas, i.e., balconies, decks, pools, sports center, clubhouse.

GARAGE DOOR EMERGENCY KEY

As a new resident, you should have been given the original remote provided to new owners by the previous owner. If lost or not provided, purchase a remote and the office will program it. In the event of a power outage, you should also have been given a key to manually open the garage door. If you do not have this key, take the two-digit number located on the lock of your garage door with your unit number to the office. Make sure that the key works. If there is a problem, check that the numbers on the lock match the numbers on the key. Return to the office for help if there is any problem.

A \$5.00 fee for each key requested.

IN THE EVENT OF POWER FAILURE

Follow these how to steps to open garage door:

Insert key in lock, tum left or right until lock pulls.

Pull cable and push up on the top section of the door to open. This may require the help of asecond person.

If unable to open the door, leave the lock

hanging on the cable. This will let others know that you have it unlocked and need help.

Do not wait until the last minute to make an appointment for help.

Do not call the office for help unless the lock is hanging loose, or you have your key in the lock. We have 375 garage doors and one set of master keys. One person cannot open that many doors at once.

Store your key in an easily accessible location. Remember **where your key is located.**

If you have any other garage problems, please submit a **Work Request.** The Association will respond to requests as soon as possible. If it is an emergency, please call the office at **310-325-3080.**

If you lose your remote, check with the office for directions on how to order a new remote at **your** (owner's) expense.

Go Green

What Do We Do with All Those Cardboard Boxes?????

New Horizons wants to provide our neighbors with boxes to pack and remove boxes as you unpack. An effortless way to do that is to simply re-use your cardboard moving



boxes. Your realtor will get the name of volunteers here at NH, who can collaborate to getting the boxes to whoever might need them, or facilitate recycling via U-Haul (which takes used boxes for their customers.

Then there are the hundreds of Amazon boxes arriving daily. While we do have huge blue recycling containers here in NH, those boxes must be broken down and placed there for recycling. In general, it is better to recycle paper/cardboard (though it might depend on your location and how good recycling is in your area).

Paper/cardboard recycling is often the easiest, and most efficient of all the materials we can recycle. It saves lots of CO2 and forests from being logged.

That said, any paper that is dirty (napkins, take out containers, pizza boxes, etc.) cannot be recycled anyway, so those are good for compost. In general, I recycle all the paper that is in undamaged shape, compost any paper that's dirty.

Landscape Committee (Formerly GO Green)

Since our decision to focus on bringing our NH landscaping into **Drought Tolerant Guidelines**, our committee has launched a monthly meeting with **PMP** and **Southern California Tree & Landscape (SCT&L)** to share recommendations and concerns from homeowners. We will collaborate with SCT&L to present agreed-upon plans and estimates for drought tolerant plants to the Board for approval and funding.

Our first project will be in a section of **Area 5**. A tree was removed over a year ago, leaving an unsightly dead zone. SCT&L agreed this area needs renewal, and we are developing a plan. We hope to have the project completed within a month and begin work on another area. Please feel free to call us with your suggestions. We will review, prioritize, and bring the project to SCT&L, always with water conservation and aesthetics in mind.

Reminders for our homeowner Gardeners.

- 1. We want to support and respect our landscapers, so please do not interrupt their work to ask them to do special jobs for you. Instead, fill out a **Work Request**. PMP can then plan with SCT&L to conform to the Community Plan.
- 2. According to Homeowner Rules & Regulations posted on the Clubhouse bulletin board, homeowners must ask permission prior to removing or planting in the common areas (includes around individual homes). Again, please complete a **Work Request**.
- 3. Please do not use artificial plants on balconies, they end up disintegrating and/or pieces are blown away and raked up with greenery waste poisoning the compost with plastic toxins.

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
